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The Doorway to the Year

wonder what sort of doorway you might be facing in life right now? What colour, what shape, what design is it? Is it a big, heavy, hard to open door or a glass door that you can see through? Is it open, closed, or slightly ajar? I wonder how you feel facing this door – scared or excited? Are you worried about what is the other side of it? It might be that you are facing lots of doors and don't know which to open. Every day we face decisions - what to do or say or

how to act. Some of these decision are small, and others might feel life changing.

The month of January is named after the Roman god Janus, the god of the doorway. He is depicted with two faces, looking both forwards and backwards. There are many points in the Christian calendar that prompt us to look forward as well as backwards. Candlemas, for example, when the baby Jesus is presented at the temple, marks the end of the Christmas season but the prophecies of suffering point us towards the cross. Then there is Easter when we celebrate resurrection, and new life out of death. Endings and beginnings.

I preached about doors in my school chapel at Candlemas, and a teacher responded by writing a poem which I think is so beautiful I want to share it with you now (with permission).


With a changed organising team, it took us a while to cope with some of the technology for producing the posters and maps. But we got there and had everything in place well before 1st December.

Extended study leave







Tips for eco-gardening

- Avoid the use of chemical-based pesticides and fertilizers harmful to wildlife and the environment.
- Use stuff from the household for gardening. You can use vegetable scraps, grass clippings and plant trimmings by turning them into compost.

5. Why not devote a patch of your garden to growing your own food? It's cheaper, reduces your environmental impact and


- tastes better knowing you've grown it yourself. You can grow plenty of foods, including vegetables like carrots and potatoes, and fruit such as apples and berries. Cherry and crab apple are two native trees you could plant to grow your own fruit.
- 6. Create a pond in your garden to encourage wild life. Even a small pond can be home to an interesting range of wildlife including damsel and dragonflies, frogs and
- newts. Any pond can become a feeding ground for birds, hedgehogs and bats, the best natural garden pest controller.
- Last but not least, save water by keeping a water butt in the garden to collect rainwater and, wherever possible, use a watering can and avoid using a hose.

St Mary's churchyard





One of our team has been repairing and repainting one of the churchyard seats. This has taken place in the boiler room, a good place to work on a cold, wet winter's morning! The work is almost completed, meaning that come the hot days of summer those folk on a walk to the church will be able to take time to sit in the churchyard and enjoy listening to either the birds or the bells!

Encouraging wildlife: over coffee recently, the working party at St Mary's discussed a paper produced by one the team describing ways more wildlife could be encouraged in St Mary's churchyard. The principles agreed were to provide:



- 1. accessible and dignified areas for graves and ashes,
- 2. safe paths through the site and maintain them,
- 3. attractive surroundings for the church,
- 4. attractive areas for outdoor events,
- 5. an amenity for local people
- 6. a haven for wildlife.

All areas of the churchyard were reviewed, aiming to agree what has to be done to meet some of these targets on work currently being carried by the small team working on Monday and Friday mornings. A plan for the noticeboard in church was suggested showing activities in various churchyard areas to make everyone aware of what is being achieved.

We've already had some lovely comments concerning the state of the churchyard and its wildlife. However, it would be good if you could check the notice board to see what's being done, and whether there's any way you can help to encourage the plants and wildlife that God has given us!

Preparing for Spring

verybody's garden is different so, instead of saying what readers should do, I will tell you what I shall be doing.

Maybe some inspiration or forgotten ideas may come to light.

Everything starts with the garden shed. I shall be going into mine to make sure all the garden machinery and tools are in good working order. Mustn't forget a drop of oil on the the wheelbarrow axle - so much better when it's not squeaking! Perhaps a broken handle should be repaired? I shall check the leads for electrical items: lawn mower, hedge cutter, etc to make sure they are not damaged. And the weed killers, sprays and fertilizers to see if any need replacement - there's nothing worse than finding it's run out just when you need something!

On to the greenhouse. I shall make sure over-wintering plants are okay, remove dead leaves, give them a light watering, taking cuttings and pot up.

When the weather is dry, I shall clear the last of the leaves and put them on the compost heap, give the lawn its first trim but not too short. The grass cuttings go on the compost heap. Finally I shall cover the compost heap with about 2in. of soil to help it to rot down.

I shall talk about the compost heap later and for the Eco followers, we've always had a compost heap and never use the green caddy.

Bike and Hike 2021 - Part 1











The annual Beds & Herts Historic Churches Trust 'Bike and Hike' was established in 1992 to raise money to help the restoration and repair of churches and chapels in the two counties. Of the sponsorship money raised 50% goes to our church and 50% goes to the Trust.

Our church usually sponsors Peter and Rosemary Bladon who, over recent years, have probably raised thousands by pounding the streets of Hemel. As they were unable to take part this year for personal reasons, I decided to take up the challenge. The date, 11th September, coincided with the 150th Celebrations at St Mary's so my plan was to arrive at St Mary's, join the barbecue at lunchtime and then finish my route.

I aimed to visit forty churches or more, starting at the top of the hill in Wiggington. Colin drove me there and, as soon as 9.00am ticked over, he took the first photo at Wiggington Baptist Church (1) before I rode for about two minutes to my second - St Bartholomews in Wiggington (2). It was then all downhill to St Peter's & St Paul's in Tring, the first to be staffed by a friendly face and a link to All Saints as I met John Allen's sister.

They were busy getting ready for a wedding later and, after the statutory photo and signing in, I was soon on my way to church number four - Tring Baptist, followed by St Martha's which was a bit tucked away. While working out my route to New Mill Baptist Church, I met another cyclist who knew the way so we chatted about other cycling challenges and soon arrived at an open church and the first offer of refreshment.

My new found companion was heading off next to the nether regions of the Bucks/Herts borders. I turned my attention to Aldbury to visit St John the Baptist (3), a church I have visited often in my quest to improve my bell ringing. Another open church and more refreshments. I got to my first St Mary's in Northchurch, arriving there at 10.38am after having ridden 9 miles.

Thoughtfully they had provided open house refreshments and it was here I met a family group of walkers and cyclists. I then 'captured' Northchurch Baptist Church (4) before heading into Berkhamsted and up the hill to All Saints (5) which was open and again a familiar church to me. Another connection was that I have sung there a few times with the Hospice Choir and the 'church sitter' knew my big sister.

Berkhamsted is a great place as you can 'catch' a number of churches in a small distance - Sacred Heart (6), the Quaker Meeting House (7), St Peter's (8), Berkhamsted School Chapel, Baptist Church (9) and Sunnyside (10) followed in quick succession. 11.27am and 16 churches ticked off!















